3.6a - Where Was Ancient Greece?

a. locating ancient Greece on a map of the world



Ancient Greece was located on a **peninsula** (a piece of land mostly surrounded by water) with many **islands** in the **Mediterranean Sea**.

- The boundaries of Greece changed over time as the Greeks traded and settled in new areas.
- Greece today is still on a peninsula with many islands in the Mediterranean.

3.6b - Geography

b) describe the unique geography of ancient Greece

Greece had mountains, hills, and rocky land, which made **farming difficult**.

Because there was not much fertile soil, the Greeks:

- Built ships and became traders
- **Fished** in the seas
- Grew small crops like olives and grapes



Greek ships traded with across Mediterranean Sea

The sea connected

Greece to other lands and helped them **trade** across the Mediterranean.

Direct democracy in ancient Greece

The Greeks invented **democracy**, which means "government by the people."

- In direct democracy, people voted themselves on laws and rules instead of electing representatives.
- The city of Athens is known as the birthplace of democracy.
- The United States government is based on some ideas from Greece and Rome, but we have a representative democracy (we elect leaders to vote for us).

d) describe the arts and innovations

Ancient Greeks were known for their **art and inventions**.

- Arts included:
 - Pottery
 decorated with
 pictures of daily life
 - Theater plays (tragedy and comedy)

displayed in public places



- Innovations included the
 Olympic Games, which
 focused on physical health
 and competition.
- Today's Olympics are modeled after the ones first held in ancient Greece!

3.6e – Architecture and Its Influence

e) identify and explain the architecture and its influence in the world today.

The Greeks built beautiful structures with columns and arches.

 The most famous building is the Parthenon in Athens.



- Workers likely
 used simple machines like ramps and pulleys
 to build these great structures.
- Greek architecture influenced buildings all around the world, including the **United States**.

Many government buildings in Washington, D.C. (like the U.S. Capitol) have Greek-st65tyhjyle columns.
